Keynote: Edith Stein: Meeting the Needs of the Times Dr. Melissa Miller Chastain

Dr. Melissa Miller Chastain is Associate Dean of the College of Social Sciences & Humanities and the Director of the Edith Stein Center at Spalding University in Louisville, Kentucky. Her education includes a PhD in Rhetoric, Duquesne University; MA in English Literature & Theory, Duquesne University; and BA in English Literature from Westminster College.

Dr. Chastain has been at Spalding since 2004, teaching undergraduate courses and graduate courses including Communication Theory; Decision-Making; and Change Acceleration in Organizations. Accomplishments include: past president of National Association for Communication Administration; Lumina Foundation's National Communication Association Learning Outcomes Project and Teaching Interfaith Understanding Project funded by the Henry Luce Foundation. She holds a govennorial appointment to the state's PBS affiliated, Kentucky Education Television (KET) Authority Board. Dr. Chastain's research interests include the philosophy of communication, communication ethics, interreligious dialogue and the work of 20th century German, existential phenomenologist, Edith Stein. Publications include "The Religious Philosophy of Edith Stein: Knowledge and Faith" in Memphis Theological Seminary Journal. Rhetoric and Religion; "Learning Outcomes and the Importance of Stakeholder Feedback," Communication Education; and "Communication Ethics: Edith Stein," An Encyclopedia of Communication Ethics.

Keynote: On the Pleasures and Frustrations of a Life of Learning: Remembering My Life in School Arthur P. Bochner, 2018 Julia T. Wood Awardee

Arthur P. Bochner is a Distinguished University Professor at the University of South Florida, where he served as Chair for eight years and was the principal architect of that department's doctoral program. He received a Bachelor's Degree in Speech Education from California University of

Pennsylvania and was on the faculty at Temple University for ten years. Dr. Bochner's book, Coming to Narrative: A Personal History of Paradigm Change in the Human Sciences, received the best book award from the International Congress of Qualitative Inquiry (2015) and from the National Communication Association's (NCA) Ethnography Division (2014). He has been the recipient of a host of named awards for scholarship, teaching, and service including NCA's Charles Woolbert Award, Bernard J. Brommel Award, and Samuel Becker Award, Ohio University's Elizabeth Andersch Award (2006), SSCA's Michael Osborn Award, ICQI's Lifetime Achievement Award, and the McKnight Foundation's William R. Jones Most Valuable Doctoral Mentor Award for mentoring minority students. In 2007, he received the inaugural Alumni of the Year Award from the College of Arts and Sciences at California State University, Pennsylvania (2007). He has been selected as an NCA Distinguished Scholar and served as President of NCA in 2008. Dr. Bochner has given numerous keynotes and workshops on narrative, autoethnography, and qualitative research at international conferences including The Conference on Biography-Autobiography-Narrative in Lodz, Poland; The Qualitative Research Conference and Quality End of Life Care Research Group at the University of Saskatchewan, Canada; the Israeli Center for Qualitative Research of People and Society in Negev, Israel; The University for Humanistics in Utrecht, The Netherlands; Beijing Broadcasting University; and the University of Art and Design in Helsinki, Finland. 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

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

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
