Building Pedagogical Capital Through Undergraduate Research

Sheryl Goodman, Ursinus College

In this panel, we introduce facets of the idea of pedagogical capital, which we consider as rooted generally in Bourdieu's (1986) notions of cultural and social capital. As in Bourdieu's conceptualization, "capital" implies resources that lead to desired personal, social, and/or cultural outcomes. Pedagogical capital results from particular ways of teaching, including structuring learning, engaging students, developing assignments, and evaluating work. Pedagogical capital may accrue from approaches that work for students and take the form of goodwill and likelihood

of recommendations of professors and/or classes based on reputation derived from student experience. In this sense, the past feeds the present and the future. Pedagogical capital may also refer to departmental reputation in the eyes of administrators. The work of Arnett (1992), focused on the importance of conversation about ideas and between persons taking place in an educational institution's mission, provides such insights, suggesting that the notion of pedagogical capital is situated on the narrative ground of a given place. The notion of pedagogical capital resonates with applied communication as philosophically-informed communicative practices (Fritz, Bell McManus, & Kearney, 2023) given life in educational institutions. This panel offers three contributions to explore this concept, each taking a different perspective to inform and develop the idea of pedagogical capital as we ponder our past and forge our future in the communication field, an area traditionally rich with such capital.

Faculty Learning Communities (FLCs) often bring cross-disciplinary faculty and professional staff together around a common goal. Many times, that goal is to enhance pedagogy and praxis.
