We are honored to host the 84th annual convention of the Pennsylvania Communication Association and hope that you all have a great experience here at our small-but-very-active campus! Founded in 1934, Penn State Schuylkill is one of Penn State's commonwealth campuses. Penn State is Pennsylvania's only land-grant institution, whose mission is to provide access to affordable high-quality education, conduct and promote research to improve people's lives, and engage with our communities in order to make them better places to live

These students will go on to mentor others in their chosen fields, just as we have been mentored by those who came before us. In this way, mentorship is very much part of PCA and the conference theme this year.

In light of this year's conference theme, the participants on this roundtable will look to the past of the organizations, institutions, and debate community at large as important piers from which we might better build towards the challenges and difficulties looming ahead for debate and forensics education. The participants are comprised of current and former debate coaches and program directors from a variety of institutions around Pennsylvania, representing debate teams that span a multitude of traditions and histories, including policy debate, public forum, civic debate, Lincoln-Douglas, and limited preparation styles of competition. Collectively, the coaches will be able leverage their own experiences in the tension between being anchored within an institutional legacy while also confronting the inevitable change wrought by technological advancement, institutional conflict, pedagogical philosophies, and economic hardship. In lieu of individual papers—and in the spirit of debate's embrace of dialogue as a means of scholarly inquiry—the participants will treat the session as a deliberation with one another, using a series of questions regarding debate education as a guide, ultimately resulting in an engaging roundtable with insights not just for debate coaches but for everyone with a stake in communication education.

Public memory, which is often associated with place has been described as "a body of beliefs and ideas about the past that help a public or society understand both its past and its present, and, by implication, its future" (Bodnar, 1994, p. 76) These "memory places" are "simple and ambiguous, natural and artificial, at once immediately available in concrete sensual experience and susceptible to the most abstract elaboration" (Nora, 1989, p. 18). In this panel, six undergraduate scholars from the host institution, Penn State Schuylkill, will discuss different memory places in Schuylkill County using Blair, Dickinson & Ott's (2010) six assumptions of public memory. Pedagogical Capital: Education in an Applied Communication Key to Pondering our Past and Forging our Future

Building Pedagogical Capital Through Undergraduate Research Sheryl Goodman, Ursinus College

In this panel, we introduce facets of the idea of pedagogical capital, which we consider as rooted generally in Bourdieu's (1986) notions of cultural and social capital. As in Bourdieu's conceptualization, "capital" implies resources that lead to desired personal, social, and/or cultural outcomes. Pedagogical capital results from particular ways of teaching, including structuring learning, engaging students, developing assignments, and evaluating work. Pedagogical capital may accrue from approaches that work for students and take the form of goodwill and likelihood of recommendations of professors and/or classes based on reputation derived from student experience. In this sense, the past feeds the present and the future. Pedagogical capital may also refer to departmental reputation in the eyes of administrators. The work of Arnett (1992), focused on the importance of conversation about ideas and between persons taking place in an educational institution's mission, provides such insights, suggesting that the notion of pedagogical capital is situated on the narrative ground of a given place. The notion of pedagogical capital resonates with applied communication as philosophically-informed communicative practices (Fritz, Bell McManus, & Kearney, 2023) given life in educational institutions. This panel offers three contributions to explore this concept, each taking a different perspective to inform and develop the idea of pedagogical capital as we ponder our past and forge our future in the communication field, an area traditionally rich with such capital.
